Mission Statement:

To provide pathways to economic independence for all families by leading community initiatives that address the root causes of poverty.

Introduction and Overview:

Community Action agencies around the nation have waged war on poverty since their inception in the 1960s. Community Action employees are uniquely qualified to discuss the needs of the communities they serve because they collaborate directly with individuals and families as they strive to rise out of poverty. In most cases, Community Action agencies provide numerous services to individuals and families struggling with multiple poverty-related challenges.

Central WV Community Action, Inc. is one of 16 Community Action Agencies in Mountain State. It is a private, non-profit corporation that provides a wide range of services to low-income families and individuals. Central WV Community Action Inc.'s employees and volunteers strive to make the communities they serve a better place to live. The agency offers Head Start, Community Transportation, Community Services, VITA, and Housing: Emergency Repair and Replacement.

Gilmer, Harrison, Lewis, and Ritchie Counties



Head Start:

Central WV Community Action Inc. was incorporated on August 22, 1968, and began services for Head Start families in 1969. Central's Head Start program serves 353 eligible children from their third birthday to kindergarten eligible five. These enrollees are recruited from Gilmer, Harrison, Lewis, and Ritchie Counties.

Services for Children and Families

Head Start programs are helping children get **ready to succeed in school and** life through learning experiences tailored to their changing needs and abilities.

Early Learning and Development

Our programs are:

- Building solid relationships as the foundational driver for early learning
- Engaging families in their child's learning and recognizing parents as a child's first and most influential teacher
- Implementing effective practices to promote children's growth in five key domains: approaches to learning, social and emotional development, language and literacy, cognition, and physical development
- Encouraging learning through play, creative expression, and guided activities with schedules and lesson plans that include the cultural and linguistic heritage of each child and family in relevant ways.
- Creating welcoming learning environments in indoor and outdoor settings that are well-organized and safe
- Conducting **ongoing screenings and assessments** to ensure each child is making progress and collaborating with parents and community agencies when a further review is needed
- Supporting the full inclusion of children with disabilities and building on their strengths

Health and Wellness

Our programs are:

- Engaging all children in both indoor and outdoor physical activity
- Serving breakfast, lunch, and snacks that are healthy and nutritious
- Ensuring children receive medical, dental, hearing, vision, and behavioral screening
- Making sure children brush their teeth after meals and promoting oral health and hygiene
- Helping families understand and support their child's health and behavioral health needs
- Assisting with mental health services for children and families, as needed
- Building **resilience** to help children and families heal from traumatic experiences or events and overwhelming situations

Family Well-being

Our programs are:

- Providing parenting support and strategies
- Supporting parental health and links to community services during **pregnancy**
- Connecting families to community and federal assistance
- Assisting families in identifying and reaching their goals and dreams, including those related to finances and economic mobility, housing, employment, and education

Family Engagement

Our programs are:

- Inviting parents to share information and insights about their child
- Celebrating the role of fathers and male caregivers through father engagement
- Engaging parents as their child's lifelong advocate
- Welcoming parents to offer ways to improve children's and families experiences in the program, including through leadership roles on the **Policy Council**

During the 2021-2022 school year, 357 children were served. The program did not reach full enrollment of 353.







Attendance:

Head Start Performance Standards state that when the daily average attendance rate in a center-based program falls below 85 percent,

Head Start must analyze the causes of absenteeism. Central West Virginia Community Action Inc., ERESA Specialist, adheres to this regulation by reviewing all absences and obtaining proper documentation.

Attendance Plans are created for families whose children are considered to have severe or chronic absenteeism. These plans educate the parents on why good attendance is essential, identify and remove barriers to poor attendance and decrease absenteeism.

The most common reasons for absenteeism are illnesses, no transportation, weather, hospitalization, or family situations. All families receive a home visit if their child misses two unexcused/unaccounted absences.

Health and Mental Health Services:

Head Start Performance Standards require children to obtain a physical and dental exam while enrolled in the Head Start Program. Central Head Start works with each family to ensure that they have an ongoing continuous health care source.

Head Start provides funds to cover the cost of a physical or dental exam if a family cannot obtain health care coverage for their child.





Mental Health

Central WV Community Action Inc., Head Start, works with various mental health professionals to provide our children and families services. These professionals are private practice psychologists and the Board of Education Behavioral Health Specialists. Ten teachers received assistance from a mental health consultant through observations and consultation, and staff had access to the consultant for individual support.

Family Services

Central WV Community Action Inc., Head Start, supports parents as primary educators, nurturers, and advocates for their children. Head Start firmly believes parent engagement is essential to a successful program.

Policy Council shares governance responsibility with the agency Board of Directors regarding program goals, planning, annual grant/budget, agency policies, and personnel functions.





Early Childhood Education

Central WV Community Action, Inc., Head Start program, utilizes the Creative Curriculum as the framework to provide experiences for children. This curriculum aligns with the Head Start Child Development Early Learning Framework and West Virginia Early Learning Standards Framework. The Creative Curriculum guides teachers in setting up the environment to help children develop needed skills that ensure future educational success.

Throughout a program year, Child Development Coordinators evaluate teachers using CLASS and The Creative Curriculum Fidelity. CLASS is designed to observe a teacher's interactions, while Creative Curriculum Fidelity ensures that the curriculum is adhered to.

Children are screened on developmental and social-emotional skills within the first forty-five days of enrollment. Central WV Community Action, Inc. Head Start utilizes the Brigance Preschool Screen II is the developmental screening tool. Parents are encouraged to share information by completing the Brigance Self-Help/Social-Emotional and the Brigance Rating Form. Teachers complete daily observations as part of their ongoing assessment of children. Observations are assigned a level using the West Virginia Early Learning Standards. School Readiness Goals are established continuously through the assessment information and ongoing monitoring. Assessment reports are reviewed three times during the school year by the Child Development Coordinators and provided to the Policy Council and Board of Directors

CLASS

The Classroom Assessment Scoring System is an observational tool that focuses on classroom interaction that boosts children learning. Data from CLASS assist the program in providing professional development for teachers.

Classroom Staff Qualifications

- **98%** of preschool classroom teachers that meet the degree/credentials requirements of Section 648A (2) (A) (BA or higher ECE/related) will become effective in September 2013.
- 100% of preschool classes in which at least one teacher meets the teacher degree/credentials requirements of Section 648A (3) (B) (AA degree or higher-ECE/related) that became effective in October 2011.
- 100% of preschool classroom assistant teachers with a CDA/equivalent or higher or are enrolled in CDA or ECE degree program.

Transitions to Kindergarten

Central West Virginia Community Action Inc., Head Start Transition Procedure assists children and families in smoothly transitioning from Pre-K to Kindergarten.

Transitioning activities:

- Teachers invited Board of Education staff (Teacher or Principal) to visit the Head Start classrooms
- Head Start classrooms visited Kindergarten classrooms
- Family Coordinators provide information to parents on easing the transition to kindergarten and parent's rights and responsibilities
- Collaborated on IEPs to determine placement
- Transfer records upon request.
- The teacher completed the Kindergarten Transition Reports. (Kindergarten teachers can access this report for the following school year).
- Cafeteria meal-style service was implemented

Disabilities

Seventy-three children enrolled in the program had an Individualized Education Program Plan, indicating they have been determined eligible by the LEA to receive special education and related services. Twenty-three children qualified under speech/language, forty-nine under non-categorical /developmental delays, and one under visual impairments. All services were provided to children with an IEP.



Budget Summary

Central WV Community Action. Head Start received funds from the Department of Health and Human Resources in the amount pf \$3,148,210 for the program year 2020-2021, which includes \$37,283 in Training and Technical Assistance and \$37,496 for a 1.22 % Cost- of Living Increase.

Central Head Start also received two one-time funding grants: COVID Relief Funding of \$106,242 and American Rescue Plan Funding of \$422,365 from the Department of Health and Human Resources. These funds were awarded in April 2021 and expire in March 2023.

Head Start received meal reimbursement from Child and Adult Feeding Program was \$79,009.83, and \$52,261.68 thru agreements with Lewis and Harrison County Boards of Education.
